# Risk Critical / Operational

### Safe reversing of appliances

The Health and Safety Executive has recently successfully prosecuted a grocery wholesaler who was found responsible for the tragic death of a worker who was crushed by a reversing HGV.

The wholesaler was fined £1 million for the death of the father of two. This serves as a reminder of the risks we face when safe reversing procedures using bankspersons are not followed.

The form 400 *Adverse Safety Event Investigation Report* has been updated to reflect the new SharePoint ASE form to be completed prior to FireWatch implementation.

Section 3.5 of the report asks if "CCTV has been obtained or viewed" as part of the investigation – this is mainly to satisfy vehicle accidents, however this is not exclusive and can be used in other adverse safety event investigations where necessary.

Please can all personnel required to carry out investigations download the new template to ensure the changes are included in their future reports.
